

auctions each week. Anyone who grows produce within a 100-mile radius of the Tri-County Produce Auction Co-op, whether a large commercial grower or just a gardener with surplus vegetables, is considered a local grower. The majority of the items come from the Amish that live in the area.

Columbia County Master Gardener Volunteers

Vice President Jean Damm called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM, and lead the meeting until President Carol Ziehmke arrived at 6:15 PM. Carol had a previous commitment. Meeting was hosted at the Columbia County Administration Building.

Minutes: Secretary's Notes from the March meeting were moved to approve by Marie Rohrbacher and seconded by Lila Waldman. The motion passed.

Treasurer's Report: March's account balance was \$6,885.76 Our new balance is \$6,310.76. The report will be sent to the audit committee.

Introductions: Tonight we shared our name and what we did to enjoy today's weather. In attendance were: George Koepp, Lori Nadolski, Bill Damm, Lila Waldman, Linda Haddix, Sue Bradley, Marie Rohrbacher, Sherryl Stolte, Leah Stark, Debbie Buechner, Donna McElroy, Don Meyer, Jean Damm, Ardyce Piehl, Carol Zeihmke.

Old Business

LGGG 2018 – Financially we ended up approximately \$76 in profit, when taking into account the support of the extension office. The committee has a lot of evaluative data to assess. Ardyce Piehl distributed two papers to members: the budget review and the evaluation packet.

"Spring Fling" at Ace Hardware Report—This event went very well. Our table had a front spot. Lila Waldman took the first shift. Our Master Gardener Volunteers taught how to transplant seedlings. Kelly Tomko demonstrated how to make seed tape with toilet paper. They answered a lot of questions. Even though the weather was bad, there was a good turn out and people will probably request this again in the future.

MGV Banner Update—We used our table sign at the "Spring Fling" event, but it will be nice to have a new banner. Carol Ziehmke has contacted Two River Signs and their Graphic Designer is currently working on it. We hope to have it completed and in our possession for the county fair. Members discussed which logo to use. The UW extension logo will be changing, and we may wait until that is complete. We imagine that a combination of our in house photos, selected logo and

contact information will be a part of the layout. When a prototype is complete, it will be shared.

Summer Bus Trip—Linda Haddix reported that a check was sent to Bookworm Gardens. We are estimating 30 participants. The bus will cost \$40/person. We will likely reserve a classroom at the Visitor Center at the Horicon Marsh. The cost for the room is \$35.00. Cost will need to include a tip for the bus driver. The committee will meet soon to finalize the cost per person, determine the lunch menu, registration deadline, advertisements, and any remaining tasks.

Micro-Farm Recap—Both farms are currently here at the extension of-fice. Events for this past Spring were: Pardeeville kindergarten class, John Muir 3rd graders, and the Heritage House. Events this last fall were: Fall River, St. John's, Randolph. At the Heritage House, residents reminisced about their childhood memories with our MGV's. They wanted to plant beets. We left a flat with them to re-pot outside. There was at least a dozen participants. Some of the staff helped out. We are told that the residents sang to the plants.

MGV Training class Update—We have 12 students this year! This is the largest class in many years. They are enthusiastic.

Portage Community Garden Update—Sue Bradley reported. There are 24 plots and a waiting list to get in. A rototiller was donated by Ardyce Piehl. George leads monthly meetings at 6 PM, on the third Thursdays of each month for this summer. They may ask for mentors. Sue will forward requests to our group if more mentors are needed. The garden is located on Silver Lake Drive in Portage, by the airport.

Columbus Community Garden—If someone is looking for hours, the Columbus Community Garden could use help coordinating and organizing the garden. They could also use some help for advertising. If someone has interest, let George know and he will forward your name to them.

New Business—4-H Planter at Links

May 17th at 6:00 PM. The 4-H clubs can arrive earlier if necessary. Becky Gutzman and Ardyce Piehl will be there. It's fun to see the containers at the Fair.

Columbia County Fair Committee—Jean Damm, Leah Stark and Carol Ziehmke are on this committee. This is the fair booth that we have put up at the county fair the last several years. Our members work the

booth and sign up each year. George will arrange making the deposit to reserve our spot/booth. \$150.00

CC Health Center Perennial Flower Bed—Mandy Herwig called George. It is a 10 x 15 plot that needs some work. It's full of Echinacea, phlox, and other perennials that have become overgrown. We might be able to relocate those plants down by the water. Residents may help if possible. Jean Damm has the written contact information from Mandy.

Pardeeville Ambulance Building—Carol Ziehmke was contacted by someone on the board of the Ambulance Building, located by the post office. It's a large metal building with only grass. They are thinking about adding some shrubs and are asking for suggestions and/or ideas for plantings. We could maybe use the list we got from Dave and LGGG and give it to them.

Linda Haddix moved to adjourn the meeting at 6:58 PM. Deb Buechner seconded the motion. The motion passed.
