Columbia County Master Gardener's Association August 31, 2021

In attendance were: Deb Buechner, Ann Maie Fuerst, Ardyce Piehl, Terry Socha, Rita Socha, Jeam Damm, Bill Damm, Lila Waldman, Lori Nadolski, Donna McElroy and Linda Haddix.

Attempts were made to connect to Zoom, but were unsuccessful. Sorry about that!

The meeting was called to order by President Deb Buechner. Introductions were made with clever answers to "What's your favorite thing about comuters?"

Secretary's Report: A motion to approve the minutes was made by Ardyce, with a 2^{nd} by Rita. Motion passed.

Treasurer's Report: The check we sent to the IRS for our 501(c)(3) application has been returned as there was a problem with our FEIN number as it had not been activated A new check in the amount of \$275.00 was issued to continue with the process.

Checks were written to folks who submitted exhibits to the county fair, for trophies and a water bill to the Portage Youth Group for the Community Gardens. There seems to be an issue with a sewer bill at the Community Garden and we pay only the water portion of it. This will be taken care of soon.

Ending balance in the checkbook was \$3,903.61. A motion was made by Lila, with a 2nd by Terry to approve the report, which will be sent to audit.

Old Business:

Jean reported the flower judging at the County Fair went very well, but approximately one third the amount of entries were made compared to past years. She mentioned that judge this year was very good.

Scholarship committee: The rules for acceptance have been updated. We plan to increase the award amount from \$500.00 from \$750.00. It was determined that four year colleges are not the only students we want to reach out to. Considered are Farm and Industry short courses, College of Agriculture and Animal Husbandry (animal science). The money is awarded to students after the first semester is completed. The committee wants to get the information to schools, the Extension office and the media very soon. Lila made a motion to accept the report, with a second by Jean. Motion passed.

The Habitat for Humanity house in Portage needed help with planting a tree, which has been done. The next Habitat House will be in Baraboo and is seeking volunteers. Contact Lila if you are interested.

A microfarm was proposed for the MacKenzie Center. Lila talked to educator Aerial and it was determined that the Center was not an appropriate placement.

It was reported that the Extension office services are still available to us. Sarah Millard is our contact at the office.

The future of the Master Gardener program is under scrutiny. We need to stay in contact with Mike Maddox and always read the Volunteer Vibe that is sent to members. This is our lifeline to the program and Becky has volunteered to be our local contact.


Growing Library Connections

Welcome to the World of Container Gardening

In a world of limited time and space, container gardens seem to make more and more sense. Containers allow you to enjoy growing plants in places that might be thought of as impossible or unthinkable in which to plant. Poor soil or no place to put

plants in the ground is no longer an excuse for not being able to enjoy the simple pleasures of gardening.

Container gardening allows you to create special gardens to fit any situation. You may grow special plants that need a bit more attention to soil and water than you are able to provide in a large in-ground garden.

The popularity of container gardening has exploded. Plants in containers are showing up everywhere. From the front porches of bungalows to the rooftops of urban highrises to the streets of Main Street U.S.A. plants in pots can be found.



Container gardening in European countries is almost an artform where the passion for gardening is not diminished due to lack of space. Gardens show up in window boxes, balconies and decorative pots filled with flowers, vegetables and herbs on the most modest of properties.

With these gardens, individual plants can take on an entirely new look when displayed in containers highlighting the plant's unique color, texture and form.

Combination planters using a variety of plant material achieve the look of a "bouquet with roots" providing color throughout the season. Containers also allow gardeners to provide instant color anywhere and at anytime.

Containers can change the entire look of a landscape. Even when there is ample room to garden in the ground, well-placed containers within the garden can provide easy-to-achieve seasonal changes as well as bold statements.

Successful container gardeners know that a good looking, well-maintained and long-lasting container just doesn't happen. When a few basic principles are applied, even first-time gardeners can create and maintain attention-grabbing containers.


With appropriate containers and proper handling, anything that can be grown in the ground can be grown in a container.

As Hollywood would say, "Pots, Soil, Plants, Action!"

Overwintering Plants in Containers

The key to overwintering plants in containers is to prevent the soil mass from freezing and to maintain moisture in the soil throughout the winter. Freezing can be prevented by having a large soil mass in a well-insulated container or planter located in a protected area. Watering containers with needled and broadleaf evergreens such as hollies, boxwoods and ivy is essential in winter.

Most containers can be damaged by freezing and thawing conditions if the soil is left in them during winter. Large concrete and wooden planters are typically able to withstand northern Illinois winters without being cleaned out. All other planters and containers should be emptied of soil and plants and stored upside-down to prolong their useful life.
