Columbia County Master Gardener's Association Minutes - February 22, 2022—via Zoom

Linda Haddix called the meeting to order at 6:04 p.m. Minutes of the January 25 meeting were published in the February newsletter. Motion (Jean/Lori) to approve the minutes passed. The treasurer's report will be forwarded for audit. Current balance is \$3,817.65.

Jean reported on her progress with the 501c3 application. We must complete the application by March 8 in order to not lose our filing fee. Jean will get this in the mail by March 1. Fee for garden plots is not rent. Original documents for formation of our organization are stored in the Extension office.

Ardyce reported that the LGGG plans are progressing. The date is March 26. The Columbus Public Library will be hosting the virtual conference.

Linda reported on tentative plans for a tour to a peony farm in Beaver Dam. Saturday, June 4, was the date suggested. When details are finalized, the trip will be publicized. Carpooling will be used for transportation.

Lori N provided an overview of the upcoming events published in the newsletter. The May program will be Magnificent Monarchs; June will be a tour of Pat Trapp's daylily garden; July is the Columbia County fair; and August will be a garden tour at Lori Richter's. The Program Committee is looking for a member to host a garden tour in September. The October meeting will focus on presentation skills, and the November meeting will focus on technology. More in-person events, including member training, will be scheduled in 2023.

Becky reported that she is working on the 2022 directory. It will be mailed to the membership. Becky stated that the database is open until March 3 for reporting of additional 2021 volunteer and continuing education hours.

Connie said that many members like having meetings via Zoom. Becky will attempt to schedule a hybrid meeting at the library in May. ORS is not yet ready for entry of 2022 hours. If unable to locate a partner when entering hours, contact Becky.

Volunteer Pruning Opportunity

We have been asked to teach a hands-on lesson on pruning techniques with the Home Landscaping class students from Cambria-Friesland High School. Several MGVs have already volunteered to help with this project. The tentative date is **Thursday, March 31**, **12:30-2:30 PM** at the home of Becky Gutzman. There are 16 students, so it will be good to have lots of help, AND it will be a good refresher for other MGVs who would like to refresh their pruning knowledge.

We will have fruit trees (apple, pear and cherry), small fruits (aronia, blueberries, jostaberries, honeyberries, elderberries and raspberries), as well as grapevines and a few ornamental shrubs to practice our pruning skills on. Session 3: Plant This, Not That

Many invasive plants were sold in garden centers in the past and now proliferate wildly. Ann Marie Fuerst, Columbia County Master Gardener Volunteer, will share the history of this development and show us how to avoid what is considered invasive. Ann Marie became a Master Gardener Volunteer five years ago. She contributes to several community projects, such as the rose garden at the Museum at the Portage and the vintage garden at The Indian Agency House.


Kudos Columbia County MGVs for 2021 Volunteer Service

Reminder: Make Sure to Complete Onboarding Lite

All returning Master Gardeners must complete the "Onboarding Lite" course this year before reporting any volunteer hours. There have been several changes to the Program, and this is where you will become familiar with all of them. The course reviews the mission and values and the MG Program's history. The sections on purpose are an excellent way to review what we do, whom we serve, and how and when we can volunteer. The "What Counts" section will help you better understand the volunteer activities and continuing education requirements, so we can all meet the expectations. You can claim 5 hours of continuing education for taking this course, even though it will probably take you less time than that.

This course and other continuing ed opportunities are in the Canvas Classroom. You will need a NetID to access Canvas. Check the last issue of the Volunteer Vibe, which arrived in your email about January 20, for the link to getting a NetID setup. If you have trouble, please email the Program Office at: wimastergardener@extension.wisc.edu for help, or contact Becky Gutzman.

Status Update: Online Reporting System (ORS)

The ORS is being updated for 2022 and is expected to be available soon. Please remember to keep track of your hours until you are notified that it is open again. You must complete the Onboarding Lite before reporting any hours. The other significant change this year is that you will report by Partner instead of Project. For example, if you volunteer with the micro-farm project at Muir Elementary School, you will report that by searching the list for the school's name. Becky Gutzman is working on entering all the "partners" that we worked with last year, so we don't have multiple, similar entries. If you begin working with a new partner as the year progresses, they can be added at any time. For volunteer work for our own projects, like serving as an officer, working on the newsletter, or Let's Get Green and Growing, the partner is CCMGA. Thanks for your patience as we adapt to this change.
